Summary of visit;

Noise conservation program has been implemented with the workers at this location through different media formats. Noise assessments have been completed on multiple pieces of equipment and discussion was held with regards to items where double hearing protection maybe required. Additionally the committee is advised to review the above and the practical implementation of the different devices available to the workers.

Signs were in place throughout the facility advising of noise area's.

A compressor was found in the south east corner of the garage. There was no signage in this area with regards to if it was noisy. Committee is advised to review this application. The inner side of the guarding to the v-belts on the fly wheels allowed access to the pinch points. Order issued.

A review of the paint truck area was completed. There were paints and glass beads in the area that supplied the truck with the product for painting on the roadways. SDS available and sent by email. Further information to follow. If the glass beads are a WHMIS controlled product, the a supplier label is advised for the product. A workplace label maybe used if a supplier label is not available.

NOISE

The Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training, and Skills Development (MLITSD) attended this workplace in response to a notice of occupational illness. The notice of occupational illness includes a claim of noise induced hearing loss (NIHL) for a former worker, the worker was employed in the Metallurgical Lab

At the time of this visit steps taken by the employer to prevent recurrence were reviewed and compliance with requirements outlined in the Ontario Regulation 381/15 Noise (O. Reg 381/15) was verified.

The O. Reg, 381/15 sets out a maximum time-weighted average limit of 85 dBA of noise exposure over an 8-hour work shift (85 dBA Lex,8) and requires employers to implement the hierarchy of noise controls and to provide adequate training and instruction on hearing protection devices (HPD) provided to workers. The HPDs must also be appropriate and effective to protect workers against excessive noise exposures.

PROGRAM

The hearing conservation program should also provide for the actions to be taken if a hearing threshold shift consistent with noise exposure is detected by the audiograms. The steps may include re-training of the affected worker on the hearing protection devices, referring the worker to audiologist, reviewing of the worker's job to identify any changes that may cause increase in the noise exposure, and if it is necessary re-evaluation of the noise exposure. Also, the engineering and administrative controls should be reviewed to determine if any improvement's can be implemented.

The employer should also address the use of hearing aids and proper hearing protection for workers with hearing loss. Hearing aids are not designed to be HPDs and do not provide sufficient attenuation for the noise exposure. Workers should not wear hearing aids if working in hazardous noise, either as a hearing protector or in combination with hearing protection. When the hearing aid is on, the hearing aid can amplify the already hazardous noise and cause further hearing loss. Also, it is not recommended that workers wear hearing aids under earmuffs unless the workers' audiologist (or other hearing professional) has addressed the issue of the output of the hearing aid under the earmuff. Passive HPDs worn by workers with pre-existing hearing loss can, artificially increase worker's hearing loss and might reduce worker's ability to understand speech or hear auditory warning signals, imposing unreasonable safety risks. If a worker has hearing loss and is working in hazardous noise, the employer should consider providing hearing protection appropriate for that worker.

If a worker has hearing loss and is working in hazardous noise, the employer should consider providing hearing protection appropriate for that worker. The employer may refer to the CSA Standard Z1007-16 Hearing Loss Prevention Program (HLPP) Management to obtain further information with regard to hearing protection devices for workers with pre-existing hearing loss.

Training

The employer is advised that workers must be aware of health effects of excessive noise and importance of proper use of hearing protection devices. They also, must be provided with an adequate training and instruction on care and use of HPDs. The training and instruction shall include;

- limitations of the HPDs
- proper fit
- inspections and maintenance (if applicable) and
- cleaning and disinfection, with emphasis on hand hygiene when handling HPDs.
- aware of health effects of excessive noise and how to early detect noise exposure

HPD's must be appropriate and effective to protect workers against excessive noise exposures. The Noise Reduction Rating (NRR) provided on the HPD packages is used to determine the noise reduction abilities of the HPD. Since the NRR is based on the C-weighted sound measurements done under laboratory conditions, it must be de-rated to account for the A-weighted scale and the real-world conditions. The Canadian Standard Association (CSA) Standard Z94.2 - 14 Hearing Protection Devices - Performance, Selection, Care, and Use, recommends de-rating NRRs by multiplying by 0.7 for earmuffs, and 0.5 for earplugs, and subtract 3 dBA (a correction factor for measurements done on A scale).

The ototoxic substances were briefly discussed at the time of this visit. Ototoxic substances are substances which can cause or increase a hearing loss. Known ototoxic substances include solvents (e.g., toluene), metals (e.g., lead), drugs and asphyxiants (e.g., carbon monoxide). In combined exposures to different ototoxic substances or simultaneous exposure to ototoxic substances and noise, interactive effects may be observed depending on the parameters of noise (intensity, impulsiveness) and the level of ototoxicant exposure. It means that exposure to high levels of ototoxic substances (e.g., above the occupational exposure limits) and noise can cause more hearing damage than exposure to noise alone. Also, the hearing loss may occur at lower levels of noise if there is simultaneous exposure to ototoxic substances. The rationale for ototoxicity of carbon monoxide was that noise may induce cochlear damage by reducing the availability of oxygen in the tissue through increased metabolic demand and that a hypoxia-inducing agent, such as CO, may enhance any noise-induce damage. Lead has an ototoxic effect caused by a neurotoxic mechanism. To reduce the risk of hearing loss, it is advisable to reduce the exposure for noise as well as for the ototoxic substance. It is advisable to use hearing protection devices (e.g., earplugs or earmuffs) even for short duration tasks that are known to generate noise levels above the current occupational exposure limits of 85 dBA Lex8 if the exposure to ototoxic substances is likely to occur.

HPDs must be selected based on;

- · Workers exposure to noise
- Attenuation or reduction in sound level provided by the HPD;
- Manufacturer's information about its use and limitations.
